A Word from Pastor Rick

Dear Friends,

Spirituality is all the rage today. Sociologists of religion had predicted that modern societies would eventually lose their faith in God and their spiritual interest. They have come to see that this isn't true, not even in Europe where attendance in Church is mostly below 25%. It seems the people have a deep seated need for spiritual experience. So finding real atheists is still tough. Spirituality has replaced faith. Spirituality is sort of self-made religion. There is no doctrine, no institution like a church that teaches. You may hang out with others in your spiritual quest, but, in spirituality, your spiritual experience is your own.

One could well imagine that this is very liberating, but all the indications are that it isn't very satisfying. One of the outstanding characteristics of those involved in spirituality is drift from one source of spiritual inspiration to another. They are always on a quest, never at home, never at peace. I think the reason for this is obvious: there is no reason to believe that self-made religion has anything to do with a reality outside your own imagination.

You probably remember being infatuated, having a crush on someone. You would be deliriously happy when that special someone was around. The longing itself was a wonderful new experience. But if you didn't get the nerve up to move the relationship from a distant crush by asking her out (or contriving to be asked out), the interest would eventually fade. Imaginary romances are not satisfying. I think this is what a lot of spirituality is about. Just as having a crush is a witness to the need for real love, so spirituality is the witness for our need for the living God.

Jesus said something very powerful that speaks right to this fad in his prayer in John 17: "I made known your name to them (his followers), and I will make it known in order that the love with which you have loved me might be in them and I in them." The name of God stands for what he really is and has made known. It is his well-earned reputation. We would say it is true theology. Notice that Jesus says the reason he made known God's name -- his nature and ways -- is so that we might experience God's love and Jesus' real presence. To put the principle succinctly: the way to experience the love and presence of God is to study what he has revealed about himself. This of course we find in Scripture especially in the Gospels. Theology is not a dry and dusty academic discipline. It is challenging of course. We can think about God without stretching his mind. But it is the key to the experience of the living God we all long for.

I fear many Christians have fallen into the habit of modern spirituality. We look for the experience without the study and thought; but this is impossible. We want spiritual experience without challenge and without doctrine. It can't be done. Jesus made known what God is like so that we may experience him personally. We should avail ourselves of this vast and wonderful opportunity. Your partner in the great work,

April Update Board of Deacons

We had several wonderful services that took place this past Holy Season. A wonderful Palm Sunday service was followed by a very intimate and reverent Maundy Thursday service at the parsonage on Thursday evening; Pastor Rick delivered a powerful message. Easter Sunday started off with a prayer vigil on the site of our former church building. This was led by Steve Girdwood and was a powerful and emotional experience. We could not help but connect our Lord's empty tomb with the empty hole that stood before us on Easter morning. The vigil was well attended and powerful.
